



CLALLAM COUNTY POINT-IN-TIME COUNT


Continuums of Care (CoCs) are required to conduct a **Point-in-Time (PIT) count** of sheltered and unsheltered individuals and families experiencing homelessness every other year on a designated day, usually January. The graph to the right is the county PIT Count for 2020, 2021, and 2022.

Clallam County Coordinated Entry conducts the count every year and coordinates 22 agencies that include local government agencies such as county sheriff, fire departments, local tribes, and all agencies that interact with homeless.


COC forms are provided and turned in, then placed into the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS).

EXCLUDED FROM PIT COUNT

In Clallam County and throughout the country, there are individuals and families not counted because the following situations do not meet PIT Count criteria: couch surfing, living in a trailer on someone's property, living in a garage.







AGING DEMOGRAPHIC

Since 2021, we have seen a 22.5% increase in homeless individuals over the age of 55 in Clallam County.

Many of these seniors are displaced from their housing after loss of income, whether this be from loss of employment, benefits, or their partner/spouse.


Additionally, our 2022 count identified 37 individuals in the 45-54 age bracket, a 48% increase from 2021. While we cannot be sure how many will be aging into the 55+category, this trend shows our need for afforable housing in all ranges.

Coordinated Entry Data

As the table below shows, 603 households, encompassing 835 individuals across 474 single households and 129 family households sought housing services through Clallam County Coordinated Entry. Our target groups include 30% Area Median Income (AMI), chronically homeless, and those with disabilities. We use HUD approved prioritization tools and hold weekly meetings for placements. Guidelines have changed and next year, we will be working with those up to 80% AMI.

Please note: this total does not include eviction prevention funds as those are not tracked and documented in the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). Through eviction prevention programs including Eviction Rent Assistance Program 1.0 (ERAP 1.0), Treasury Rent Assistance Program (T-RAP), and Eviction Rent Assistance Program 2.0 (ERAP 2.0), we served 1,527 households from 7.1.21 to 6.30.22.

Serenity House Shelter



In the beginning of 2022, Serenity House completed a shelter expansion, pictured right, and increased capacity of the shelter from 50 beds to 160 beds. New restrooms were also added to accomodate the increase, pictured below



Additionally, we converted from old and uncomfortable cots to new, sturdy bunk beds, which can be seen in the image below.





Working with Olympic Peninsula Community Clinic (OPCC), a 4-bed medical respite has been established within the shelter, to aide and care for those needing further assistance and treatment after a hospital visit.





GOAL 1: QUICKLY IDENTIFY AND ENGAGE ALL PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS.

Action 1: Create a plan for medical discharge coordination – Status Complete: Contact awarded, 4 bed and rooms set up in Serenity House of Clallam County Shelter, Olympic Peninsula Community Clinic (OPCC) managing and operating as Of Nov 2022.

Action 2: Create a plan for behavioral health discharge coordination - Status Ongoing: Justice system established Mental Health Court, Peninsula Behavioral Health started renovating 27-units for mental health respite called Dawn View Court.

Action 3: Create a plan for those exiting incarceration - Status in Process: OPCC - ReDiscovery (offering MOUD)

Action 4: Affordable Housing Inventory and Needs Report- Status Complete: Cloudburst Gaps and Needs Analysis Resource Guides

Action 5: Resource Guide — Status Process: Outreach Committee created pamphlet and distributed to community in 2023



GOAL 2: PRIORITIZE HOUSING FOR PEOPLE WITH THE GREATEST NEEDS.

Action 1: Identify & Engagement. Status Ongoing: (PATH, Rediscovery, Sequim Health & Housing Coalition, REAL teams, PA Fire Dept, Forks Police)

Action 2: Coordinated Entry/Prioritize Based on Need. Status Ongoing: Serenity House updated Coordinated Entry manual and practices. CE continues to use HUD by name list to prioritize housing placements. Weekly meetings meeting for referrals are open to partner agencies with approved ROI.

Action 3: Coordinated Entry involving racial equity. Status complete: CE forms, racial equity inclusions and processes changed to be consistent in Jefferson and Clallam Counties.

Action 4: Coordinated Entry updated to properly house AI/AN and mixed-race clients. Status Complete: Processes validated not to have race, gender or religious bias.

Action 5: Immediate Shelter – Sequim to determine need for new Shelters. Status Ongoing: Port Angeles shelter expanded 50 beds to 160 beds total. Forks City Planner met with DHHS and Serenity to explore homeless shelter in Forks not recommended in 2021, and Sequim homeless demographics under review for Shelter.



GOAL 3: OPERATE AN EFFECTIVE AND EFFICIENT HOMELESS CRISIS RESPONSE SYSTEM THAT SWIFTLY MOVES PEOPLE INTO STABLE PERMANENT HOUSING.

Action 1: Employment & Education Planning. Status Ongoing: (WorkSource, Peninsula College, Healthy Families, Serenity House, NORVHN, Forks Abuse, High Schools, HTF Outreach)

Action 2: Social Security Disability Benefits & VA Benefits. Status Ongoing: Peninsula Behavioral Health provides FCS support to clients and county. VA visits shelter and accepts shelter referrals

Action 3: Ongoing Youth Peer Network. Status Ongoing: (TAFY, School systems, McKinney Vento PBH, HTF outreach) Serenity House Coordinated Entry for Youth provided a Drop-in Center in 2020 relocated to Coordinated entry main office 2022

Action 4: Ongoing Unpaid Work in the Community (Able bodied adults without dependents) Not Started

Action 5: Create Additional Affordable Housing Status in Process-NORVHN agency added Hobucket House, 7 new beds for veterans in Forks and has another house planned for Sequim. Peninsula Housing Authority Streamlined conversion of 170 units to section 8, RAD 33 public housing to section 8 (Sea Ridge), and started Eklund Heights, streamline conversion of 59 units public housing to section 8 (complete 9/30/22).

Action 6: Permanent Supportive Housing/Housing First Status Completed. A Housing Solution Committee was created to focus on Clallam County housing shortages.



GOAL 4: PROJECT THE IMPACT OF THE FULLY IMPLEMENTED LOCAL PLANS ON THE NUMBER HOUSED AND THE NUMBER OF HOUSEHOLDS LEFT UNSHELTERED, ASSUMING EXISTING RESOURCES AND STATE POLICIES

Action 1: A Housing Solution Committee was created to focus on Clallam County housing shortages.
